Ellie Clin is an environmental educator by training and an adventurer at heart. Dave Skene is Métis and a citizen of the Métis Nation of Ontario. He is the Executive Director of White Owl Native Ancestry Association, a community-based Indigenous agency that has endeavoured to enhance the lives of Indigenous People in the Wellington, Dufferin, and Waterloo regions since 1975. He is one of the founding members of Wisahkotewinowak an Urban Indigenous Garden collective and has been a grass-roots educational innovator for over 30 years, leading numerous teams of Canadian youth on international education projects focused on justice and community development from an Indigenous perspective. His current focus is around issues of Urban Indigenous and land sovereignty, Indigenous agricultural practices, and land-based education.



Martin Tamlyn is a community builder and teacher focused on restoration ecology within a decolonized framework. Originally trained as an elementary school teacher, he has spent the last 20 years dedicated to climate change mitigation action. He has designed and led programs in environmental home building, forest gardening, permaculture design, sustainable farming, and ecology. He currently manages the Ignatius Old-Growth Forest Project, where he facilitates community-led ecological restoration and nature connection programs.



Maurice Switzer, Bnesi, is a citizen of the Mississaugas of Alderville First Nation. He has served as an Ontario Human Rights Commissioner, publisher of the Winnipeg Free Press, communications director for the Assembly of First Nations and Union of Ontario Indians, and adjunct professor of Indigenous Studies and communications on the Laurentian University campus. He lives in North Bay, where he is currently chair of Nipissing University's Indigenous Council on Education and president of the North Bay Indigenous Friendship Centre.
